

Guidance Notes for Postal Addresses & Street Names

Address management

The address of a property is becoming a very important issue. More organisations, postal and emergency services and the general public need an efficient means of locating and referencing properties.

Under the Town Improvement Clauses Act, it is the council's responsibility to allocate property numbers and road names to new developments and property conversions. Individuals and developers should not allocate their own property numbers, building or street names.

If a property is not 'registered' it will not appear on the main address database and the owner or occupier will have difficulty in receiving mail, goods and services from a variety of sources – for example, when applying for a credit card or receiving goods by mail order. The main address database is used by the council, Royal Mail, all statutory undertakers, emergency services, credit agencies and many private companies.

Request for new postal addresses

Who should apply?

- ❖ Individuals or developers building new houses, commercial or industrial premises.
- ❖ Individuals or developers undertaking conversions of residential, commercial or industrial premises which will result in the creation of new properties or premises.

When?

You should apply for postal address in the early stages of any new build or conversion, because utility companies are reluctant to install services where an official address has not been allocated.



How?

Whichever option you choose, you also need to submit a scaled plan showing the full extent of the development.

Requests for new street names

Where new road are to be constructed, developers will need to suggest suitable names for the new roads.

The following rules apply:

- 1. Names cannot be duplicated within the Borough.
- 2. Suggested names need to be sufficiently unique to avoid confusion or misunderstanding.
- 3. Names of living people are not normally allowed.
- 4. Where possible names should reflect the history of the site or acknowledge the geography of the area. Names that could be seen as advertising are not acceptable.
- 5. Names that could be considered offensive will not be accepted.

Any new street name will require approval by the Planning Committee.

Houses with names (no postal number allocated)

If your property has a name and not a postal number and you wish to change the name of the property, you will need our approval. It could cause confusion if more than one property in the same road or vicinity has the same name. Emergency services could also be delayed in locating your property.

When a new apartment block needs a name as well as postal numbers the above rules for street names will apply.

Houses with postal numbers and a name

If you have a postal number for your property and wish to give it a name as well, it may only be used on an informal basis and will not be registered by the council. Replacing a postal number with a name causes problems for deliveries and emergency services. You can display the name on your property and use the name in the address along with the postal number, but your property will always be known be the number.



Allocation of new postal addresses and new streets

Once a new postal address or new street name is allocated we will inform all the relevant and statutory authorities and emergency organisations. We also contact the Royal Mail who are responsible for allocating postcodes. Royal Mail will not allocate a postcode unless they have received formal notification from the local authority of a new address or street name.

All new addresses are allocated in line with British Standard 7666.
